Research Highlight: Prescribing Nature



Nature prescription programs have emerged within the last 25 years to improve community health and promote environmental stewardship. There is growing evidence supporting nature prescriptions' physical, mental, and social benefits. The prevalence of nature prescription programs is expanding throughout the globe as driven by a growing body of literature revealing the health benefits of reconnecting with nature.

First launched in November 2020, PaRx is Canada's first national, evidence-based nature prescription program led by Dr. Melissa Lem in partnership with the BC Parks Foundation. They have established a program where licensed healthcare professionals can register with PaRx to receive guides and patient resources for filling nature prescriptions. Currently, PaRx operates throughout British Columbia, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and Ontario to advance patient and planetary health. One of the program's most important goals is to promote nature's health benefits for adults, children, and the planet, emphasizing strengthening our connection with nature to reinforce sustainability behaviours. Their program includes a free Parks Canada Discovery Pass (valued at \$72) to contribute to this movement, providing unlimited admission to national parks and conservation sites. Based on the findings from a <u>2019 study</u>, patients are directed to spend at least 2 hours a week in nature for at least 20 minutes each outing.

Call for health researchers: Help increase diversity in health research in BC!

Funded by the BC SUPPORT Unit, this project has created a suite of online

educational modules designed to support more diverse people in health research in British Columbia, including those in rural and remote communities. The modules have been created through collaboration with diverse stakeholders and are now ready for evaluation by health researchers.

The first module is a primer for engaging diverse people in research. Additional modules highlight how to engage with members of LGBTQ2S+, d/Deaf, disabled, rural and remote, and immigrant, refugee, racialized, and ethnocultural communities.

2022-23 RHSRNbc FLEX Project Bursary

The <u>RHSRNbc FLEX fund travel bursaries</u> to be awarded to year 1, 2 and 4 FLEX students working on rural and remote health activities. Year 1, 2, and 4 bursaries are funded up to a maximum of \$1000 each. These bursaries are intended to subsidize the costs of travel and accommodation related to your FLEX Project. Funds will be reimbursed after submission of original receipts and final report for

RHSRNbc. These bursaries may also be used to subsidize the costs associated with working remotely on a rural health project.

Rural Physician Research Grants

The <u>RCCbc Rural Physician Research Grant program</u> aims to empower rural physician-researchers – or new aspiring researchers – to pursue innovative rural research and knowledge translation projects contributing to advancing rural health in BC. Through this project, rural physician researchers will be able to apply for research grants of up to \$10,000 per year to support research activities. Applicants must be a BC physician with experience practicing rural medicine and with demonstrable extensive connections to rural communities. The research must be pertaining to health in rural BC.

Rural Global Health Partnership Initiative: For Health Equity at Home and Abroad

The <u>Rural Global Health Partnership Initiative</u> (RGHPI) is a program that provides funding to support partnerships between rural BC physicians or medical trainees committed to rural service and underserved communities in BC, Canada, and internationally. The goals of this initiative are to enhance capacity for generalism in rural BC; to foster reciprocal learning in diverse health systems and community contexts; and to demonstrate how global health (local and international) community partnerships can heighten awareness, create innovative solutions to address healthcare challenges, and lead to improved health outcomes, especially for underserved, marginalized, and indigenous populations.

Through this initiative, rural BC physicians and medical trainees (residents and medical students) with a demonstrated interest in rural medicine and global health can apply for funding up to \$10,000 to support global health partnership projects.
