#### **RHSRNbc Travel Bursary Competition**

The RHSRNbc offers four bursaries--three national bursaries of up to \$450, and one international bursary of \$750-to subsidize the cost of travel, accommodation, and other expenses related to conference participation. # CIHR Planning and Dissemination Grant: Institute Community Support (Winter 2014 Competition)

Planning and Dissemination Grants are intended to provide support for planning and/or dissemination activities consistent with the mandate of CIHR and relevant to CIHR Institutes, Initiatives, or the Chief Scientific Officer (CSO) Community Outreach Fund. Applications are due February 17, 2014, and can be found online.

## Vancouver Foundation Health and Medical Education/Research Grants

The Health and Medical Education/Research Grants focus on funding community-based research. The Vancouver Foundation supports initiatives that ensure British Columbians are involved in advancing the health equity of their own communities. These research grants allow researchers and non-profit organizations to undertake relevant research collaboratively and at the community level. Applications for Spring 2014 are now available, and a letter of intent is due January 24, 2014, with the grant application being due March 14, 2014.
